

Rosh Pinah Primary School is committed to providing the best possible education for every individual pupil. Consequently, we are determined to ensure that all pupils have the equal opportunity to achieve their full potential through exposure to a rich and exciting curriculum and carefully targeted support where necessary.

The Secretary of State for Education lays down the following terms and conditions on which assistance is given in relation to the pupil premium grant (PPG) payable to local authorities for the financial year beginning 1 April 2021.

PPG provides funding for two separate policies:

- raising the attainment of disadvantaged pupils of all abilities to reach their potential
- supporting children and young people with parents in the regular armed forces
